# The Next Step for Me by Pam Forsythe



Thanks to a generous scholarship from NWDA I was fortunate to be able to attend the Ulf Wadeborn clinic held December 3-4, 2022 at Silvermine Dressage in Eau Claire WI. Ulf is an "R" rated judge in Sweden, has his "S" USEF judging license in the US. He is also a trainer and travels across the country teaching many Dressage clinics. I have had the opportunity to train with Ulf over the last few years. Initially our focus was on my position and straightness—just staying in the middle of Millie (my very tolerant 23 year old Morgan/Friesian mare) without looking like a floppy "passenger" hanging on for dear life . . .

I often get the question from friends and family, "Why are you still taking lessons? Don't you know how to stay on by now?" This clinic helped me to come up with a way to think about my riding and helped me to move on to the next step in my riding journey.

One of the areas that I have struggled with is my posture. I tend to collapse my core and round my shoulders. Ulf pointed out to me that when this happens I hold with my arms, brace and pinch with

my legs which causes Millie to tense up to protect her back. When I open up my posture and engage my core, this allows me to relax my arms and to drop my legs into a more natural and relaxed position.

Once this happened, I was able to bring my legs back, keeping them under me, making them more stable and able to support me. When I wasn't holding with my arms I was able to actually feel Millie's mouth which allowed me to influence her more consistently. Another benefit of

## NWDA Partners with National Dressage Pony Cup & Small Horse Show for 2023

DRESSAGE PONV

To qualify for Dressage Pony Cup, Ponies and Small Horses (under 16 hands) must have a current and valid USEF Pony or Small Horse measurement card on file with USEF.

The National Dressage Pony Cup will send each Partner Show two ribbons for High Point and Reserve High Point. These ribbons are to be presented to winning competitors AT THE

SHOW based on the results of pony/small horse-only classes.

A Partner Show must include one of the following classes in the prize list: each

Partner show must offer at least one Pony/ Small Horse only test of Choice class: Pony Introductory—Third Level Test of Choice, Pony Fourth Level—FEI Test of Choice.

Alternatively, shows may offer a Pony Division within each class. This means that ponies ride in open classes, but the Rider states "Pony" as their Division, as opposed to Open/AA/YR/Jr.

Competition must provide an opportunity for ponies/small horses to be measured and obtain

a temporary or permanent USEF Pony Measurement Card. Ponies & small horses can be measured at NWDA shows, see show bill for information. The official measurements must be made by a vet, either yours at home,

or with 2 weeks notice to NWDA show management, and recorded by the vet on the small horse measurement form and submitted to NDPC. See

www.dressageponycup.com for complete information.

NDPC also has national year end awards. There is no minimum or maximum

number of scores required to be eligible. All scores from any USEF/USDF licensed competition will count toward Year End Awards. Scores from Schooling Shows do not count toward year end awards. Rider must be a member of NDPC for year end awards.

This year the NDPC show will be held July 7-9, 2023 at the World Equestrian Center, Wilimington, Ohio.

engaging my core was the ability for me to use my seat effectively. With my now upright posture and engaged core I was able to free up my seat and feel what was going on under me. By changing my posture and effectively use my legs, arms and seat I was able to use them independently from each other. I felt Millie's back relax under me. It was amazing to feel her "come onto the aides" rather than me "pulling her" onto the aides. She also offered many deep breaths and snorts as if to say "Finally, let's dance!"

Of course, this was all accomplished at the walk, on the 20 meter circle. Ulf did have me progress to trot and canter, but we would only be able to achieve this new position and use of my body for short periods. We worked through transitions especially walk<>trot<>walk, as the

trot is the most challenging gait for Millie and me. Ulf also had me start to work off the circle at the walk, but straight lines are more challenging for me as well. We would return to the circle to regroup before going to back straight lines.

When I started my dressage journey as an adult I never realized what an amazing and challenging sport I had selected. I have an amazing "horsey dance partner" that puts up with me and I have become much more aware of how the use of my body can change how Millie is able to use her body so that we are a more cohesive team. Through this clinic I realized that "less is more" and holding on actually interferes with Millie's movement and my riding progress. This is the next step for me—staying relaxed and using my body effectively so Millie can use hers as well!


